



Small Schools have Big Benefits

A one or two class school like Wingello has advantages over larger schools

Research is showing that far from being disadvantaged by attending small schools, children may actually do better. Children are less likely to be overlooked or isolated in small schools.

Everybody's participation is needed for team activities, and children in small schools come to know and care about each other to a greater degree than is possible in big schools.

Children at small schools tend to take more responsibility for their own learning, learning activities are more individualised, classes are smaller, and teachers are able to employ multi-age grouping and cooperative learning. Children feel a greater sense of engagement, belonging,

and personal value when their classmates and teachers get to know them. This in turn has a positive effect on behaviour, and behavioural problems often diminish.

Parents and teachers become allies in fostering student success. Communication between staff is easier, and they are able to work together to build a high-quality curriculum across disciplines and grade levels. Teachers have greater job satisfaction as a result.

The above is taken from a great article from a small NZ school, Paparimu Primary School, which has about the same number of students as Wingello Public School.

Wingello Public School has been a centre of the community since 1885, providing a solid starting point for countless locals making their way successfully in the wider world.

Thankfully, being a small school, children are able to gain a great many benefits compared to children attending larger schools.

Socialisation - in real life we all get to associate with others of different ages and backgrounds. In a one or two class school children learn in a more natural envi-

ronment with others older

and younger than themselves. A smaller group of 20 to 30 people all get to know each other well, allowing

both the extrovert and introvert room to develop at their own pace. In a small school, the teachers also get to know each child well, giving them the ability to apply appropriate guidance based on each child's temperament and personality.

Education - A mixed classroom environment is better suited to each child as the class consists of only 15 or so children. A common topic is presented with individual work for children tailored to each child's academic strengths and weaknesses.

This allows a child to develop socially and educationally at a pace that matches their learning abilities targeting specific support for those that may require it as well as tailored opportunities for those able to exceed their expected grade level.

External Opportunities - Wingello attends all the regional school events such as Gala days, cross country, swimming and so on. Various community groups also visit the school where every child participates.

Parental Involvement - There is much greater interaction between parents and the school principal and teachers than is possible at a larger school. It is easier participating in a smaller group of local parents and having a positive impact on your child's education opportunities, as well as getting to know your neighbours in a productive capacity.

Village Involvement - Most people choose to live in Wingello for the small village environment. The Wingello Public School only works when the parents, children and school work together with the children's best interests at heart.

Isn't it cool being able to walk or drive for only a minute or two to a good school?

Consider what route you will take and have a backup route planned in case of road blockages or a change in fire behaviour and remember to stay up to date via the NSW RFS website and **Fires Near Me**.

If you have downloaded the Fires Near Me app now is a great time to update it. Additional information such as fire danger ratings, hazard reduction activity, total fire bans and emergency warnings are now available with the new update, with further improvements to come.

As we continue to build a resilient community through prevention and preparedness it is important to remember that preparing for a bushfire is a shared responsibility with the whole community so stay safe, remain vigilant and enjoy the warm weather!
