How are rates calculated?

The shock of very high Valuer General valuations did not map to the latest rates notices

Every few years the NSW Valuer General issues updated "Notices of Valuation" for every property in NSW. This represents the unimproved value of the property, taking into account an "arms length" valuation of what the property would be worth with no improvements such as houses, buildings, fencing, landscaping, etc.

Since the last valuation, everyone's valuations have increased by very large amounts, some almost double. Many wondered if this meant that we would then experience rates increases of the same amount!

I thought it would be worth a review of how rates relate to land valuations.

The rates are calculated by multiplying a Rate per \$ valuation. If the value is less than the minimum, then the minimum applies. This would make it seem that everyone's rates should have increased by huge amounts, but not so!

The Rate/\$ above is calculated based on what has been approved as the total rates income for the year divided by the total of all the valuations. So what the increase in the Land Valuations would have done is effectively reduce the Rate/\$ which means the actual Council rates goes up by the already budgeted increase. What may change for those paying more than minimum, is that some may have a higher increase and others a lower or even decrease, depending on how their land is valued compared to everyone else's.

The reason there is a minimum levy (\$1,266.97 for 2023-24) is because every property has equal access to pretty much most of what the Council provides such as:

• Parks, Sports, Aquatics and Recreation

- Waste and recycling
- Libraries and Community services
- Roads, Transport, Paths and Stormwater

Included in the Rates is also the Weekly waste service and stormwater levy and other services depending on what is used on your property. Waste fees can be changed by adding or reducing services.

Discussions regarding how the Rates money is actually spent and trying to understand priorities and value for money are all a whole other topic!
